# No blues for organisers after festival is sold out

## Regal Centre plays host to the annual charity event

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WALLINGFORD came alive to the sounds of the delta at the weekend.

The town played host to the annual Wallingford Blues and Beer Festival, which took place over two days at the Regal Centre.

Artists such as Ian Parker, Big Boy Bloater and Mumbo Jumbo played, as well as The Blockheads who performed on Friday.

Delta blues musician Thomas Ford, 28, from Plymouth, said: "It was fantastic. I have not played in Wallingford before and I go all over Europe."

"The people running it were lovely and there was a real family feel, with children running around all over the place."

Launched in the 1990s, the charity event has raised more than £40,000 for youth music programmes and youth development in the Wallingford area.

Emma Anderson, who organised the festival, said: "It was an amazing weekend and sold out both nights, which is a first."

"Overall it was a great success."

As well as the music, people attending the festival enjoyed a range of real ales and there was also a barbecue.

The event was mainly for over-18s but the Saturday afternoon session was open to families.

This year's event supported two local charities — Oxfordshire Young Diabetics (for insulin-dependent children with type 1 dia-
